CHATTER FROM THE CHAIR

Hello again everyone.

So, here we are again, it's crazy how fast these months are flying by.

Recent test passes: Firstly, congratulations to three recent test passes, Phil Meggett, Richard Bull and Nic Holdsworth and their respective Observers. Well done to everyone involved with that.

Also let me welcome three new members this month, David Plange, Reece Lake and Jayne Bell. I hope you enjoy your advanced riding journey although Jayne has long been an IAM member and has recently moved to the area.



This article perhaps ought to carry some warning, "viewer discretion is advised"? I am trying to keep these articles current and topical. In my minds eye, the big issue for me at the moment is the recent bike related tragedy on the A61 Barnsley road, as I'm sure most of you by now know, where a family of four (two parents and two children) together with two bikers (husband and wife rider and pillion) were fatally injured at about 16:00 on Sunday afternoon 21.07.24.

I will be keeping my mind open and trying to be as non-judgmental as possible and simply regretting the whole affair.

From the released aerial video footage of the scene, the road initially appeared to be as straight as a die without hidden dips or junctions or obvious hazards. No obvious reasons for any crash.

I later saw a screen shot from road level looking towards the closed road, three investigators in their white forensic suits walking towards the photographer, a definite right-hand bend as the photographer looks at the scene with a junction warning triangle at the far left hand side of the road.

How different could those two views have been?

I saw quite a bit of early criticism of these bikers and all bikers in general.

A number of people prepared to blame the bikers at first glance, "it's obvious that the biker had to be at fault..."

On the same day, I was out biking with another group member leading me, he shall remain nameless. The other biker was also carrying a pillion.

At the end of that ride, my lead rider mentioned the slower traffic in front of us, a fuel tanker and a small red car tucked in quite close behind the tanker.

I admit, I had looked at the scene, thinking that a single rider on a bike might have explored the opportunity to overtake both vehicles, but two up, it's a different story, I immediately


discounted it and settled back to relax and take my time. I've never carried a pillion, but I'd expect most bikes to behave differently, I'm sure some of you will tell me more about that. The day was hot, it's easy to be dehydrated on a bike or in a car.

Kids in the back of a car can be a distraction.

Dehydrated or distracted or running late are all issues to be aware of and to fight against. As I write, the latest news is that the driver of a Porsche 911 has been arrested on suspicion of being involved and then released on bail.

Now, the focus moves to the "obvious speed merchant in the super car" when, just as before, we don't know the involvement of this or any other vehicle, we don't know the reason for the tragedy and even after the inquest, we may still never fully know.

Assumptions, jumping to conclusions. For us, it's important to remain calm and objective and not to make unnecessary assumptions, factor that into your riding plan.



I took the attached photo on my drive home Monday evening 22.07.24 on a major road in Doncaster near the racecourse, I was passing it at approximately 22:12. The passenger side windscreen has some very nasty looking damage to it which I tried not to jump to conclusions as to its cause.

To try and not be too morose, Gov.uk provides very detailed information on road injuries, (the KSI statistics: killed and seriously injured) grading them by class of vehicle, severity of injury, and number of miles travelled. The headline figure for fatalities for 2022 (the latest figures available) show 1,711 fatalities for that year (being a decline of 2% on 2019 levels) but still a phenomenal number in my mind. How many families, friends, work colleagues does this involve? While this number is across all road users, we are all too aware as bikers that our group feature badly in these figures and are generally involved with other vehicles to our disadvantage in any tussle with the tarmac.

On a more positive note, for what it's worth, the figures from 1979 to 2022 show fantastic reductions/improvements in overall deaths. Still so much more room for more improvement.

Ride safe, look out for each other. Ian (Chair) There have been three new members join the group since the July newsletter. Note that Paul Slater who joined in late June has been allocated to Observer Steve Goodwin.


4 July 24

Both working with your Observer and practising between your observed rides is very important to achieve good results. The Observer team is now halfway through the summer on-bike Observer training, I have spoken with some of the Observer team leaders to get feedback how the sessions are going, Junctions and roundabouts, Overtaking, Slow riding, Bend walks and cross checking each other are just some of the subjects that the teams have been working on.

Making Observation Links

This time of year I hear a lot of comments about road signs being overgrown with foliage. It happens every Summer but this year seems to be the worst that I've seen for many years. Advanced warning signs make up a vital part of our Information stage, they help us make our riding plans and decisions. If advanced warning signs become hidden, using Observation Links with our Information stage can give us early indication of what might be ahead, giving us clues to physical features and the likely behaviour of other road users. Lets look at some hidden signs that I've spotted recently....



Did you spot the sign on this NSL carriageway? What is it?





Did you spot the hidden sign, here we can use the junction and possible built-up area as our Observation Links that there maybe a speed change. Guess the new speed!





Spot the sign? No?..Lets use those Observation Links, Big SLOW painted on the road, Right handed chevron in the distance, where does the road go?




There is an Advanced warning sign there somewhere



Yep, there actually is an Advanced warning sign here. But lets look for our Observation links. Again, a big SLOW painted in the road, a left-hand chevron, limited vision point and hedge lines.




We might not have the use of the Advanced road sign but we do have plenty of Observation links. Why are those Hazard lines there?



Spot the Advanced warning sign? Spot the house

roofs? Observation Linkentering built up area? Is there likely to be a speed change?

Guess the new speed limit..It is there.



Observation Links play a crucial role in advanced motorcycle riding. They enhance safety. Situational awareness, and overall riding skill. Here's how they help:

1. Early Detection of Hazards:

- Observation links involve continuously scanning the road ahead, checking mirrors, and assessing surroundings.
- By detecting hazards (e.g. pedestrians, vehicles, road conditions) early, riders can respond proactively.

2. Effective Decision-Making:

- Regular observations provide information about traffic flow, road signs (If visible!) and potential risks.
- Riders can make informed decisions based on this data, adjusting speed, position, and gear as needed.

3. IPSGA Framework:

- Observations align with the IPSGA approach: Information, Position, Speed, Gear, Acceleration.
- Riders gather information through observations, position themselves optimally, and adjust speed and gear accordingly.

4. Blind Spot Awareness:

- Checking blind spots during observation links prevents surprises when changing lanes or overtaking.
- Peripheral vision helps riders notice vehicles approaching from the sides.

Remember, consistent practice of making Observation Links enhances riding skills and safety, it might just help when your vision of an advanced warning sign might be restricted!
